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PIFF Takes Park By Storm Film Fest Fever Infects Inhabitants

The crowd of film fanatics ate up every moment and vowed to return next year in even greater numbers. As of today, that seems likely: according to PIFF organizers, the Festival has become such a popular Park event that it could, conceivably, become a week-long

and celebrated" on 29 Barnabus.

Tens of thousands of Animals attended the films at this year's Festival, which ran the gamut from the controversial opening oeuvre, Stuffed Dogs Don't Shed, to the poignant, Down Under tale, Joining Joey, which closed the event. In between, Animals were treated to some humour (Mum and Pup Shop, Willoughby Wallaby), some tragedy (Horse with No Mane), a bit of animation (Peter Popinjay), and some fantastic footage (best-documentary winner, Stag Nation).

In all, 21 films were introduced at the Festival, but, by no means, were they the only draw: the celebrity-studded parties brought fans out in droves and had photographers snapping pictures until the wee hours of the morning. The most notable (and outrageous) of these, of course, was the "InFESTation," hosted at The Battering Ram Café by the producers of Fleas Ticked Off. That party is likely to be the talk of The Park for some time to come.

On the evening of 5 Felis, as the Festival drew to a close, PIFF

CPAP to investigate "shady" refurral services

¬ he Consumer Protection Agency of The Park (CPAP) confirmed today that it will launch an investigation into a number of "shady" refurral services that have popped up in The Park in the past few months.

In an interview, CPAP head, Ursula M. Bjørn, said that, in the past few months, her agency has received an unusual number of complaints about shoddy refurring by fly-by-night services in The

"Every year, we receive complaints about refurrals, but these are usually resolved by the client and the service provider before we have to step in. This year there are far more complaints and these [complaints] are of a more serious nature. I believe it is due to the sheer number of pop-up services that have appeared in The Park this year," she said.

For the last couple of years, The Park's Finance Office has strongly supported "pop-up retail." Humboldt Salvanius, a spokesanimal for The Park's Finance Office, said that such establishments are believed to be effective "seasonal stimulants" of the economy.

"Their operating costs are much lower than other businesses because they are only open when there is a significant need for their services. This makes them more profitable overall, which puts more Ftoo into the general economy of The Park and fuels production in other areas," he said.

According to the Finance Office, more pop-up establishments opened during this year's Groundhog Day holiday season than at any other point in The Park's history. While this is seen in a positive light in terms of retail activity, some permanent retailers fear that the ephemeral nature of these businesses puts them [the pop-up businesses] in a perfect position to "fleece" The Park's

Wellington Whistlepig, founder and current president of the Park Association of Shops and Services (PASS), believes that it is time for the Archons and the Finance Office to take control of pop-up

"[Some of them] are acting irresponsibly and this puts us [permanent retailers] in a precarious position. All retail establishments are associated together in the consumer's mind. If one retailer does a bad job of refurring, for example, it's possible that all Park grooming houses will come to be considered unprincipled by consumers and that would, in turn, lead to a significant loss of business," he said.

THE WOLVES AT OUR DOOR

Why, indeed.


In these difficult times, it is insufficient to respond with the usual arguments: that more Animals from different places make for a richer Park, both culturally and economically, or that The Park has always been a refuge for the unwanted, the hunted, the wounded, the poverty-stricken, the starving, and the scared.

These arguments will not work on Animals who have turned away from The Park's fundamental principles. We must invoke stronger arguments, lest the pressure on the Archons to enact changes become too much for them to bear.

Fellow citizens, we need only look outside The Park to see the consequences of exclusionary policies. The Human world is built of countries, cities, towns, and villages that would refuse us succour. Is this the model that we wish to emulate?

Hope, decency, concern for our fellow Animal – these are the qualities that separate us from Humans, the qualities that make us distinct. Why should we demean ourselves by hoarding instead of sharing, by shutting our doors, instead of welcoming newcomers, by limiting the numbers of those who might prosper here, unfettered and unafraid?

When the Wolves come knocking on our door this Winter, this is the question we must ask ourselves: Are we Mice or are we Men?

that the unscrupulous practices of a few pop-up businesses have put their reputations in jeopardy.

Tallulah Boxer of Tallulah's Toilettage says she has nothing against the principle of pop-up, but she thinks that consumers should be very careful about whose establishments they patronize.

"I studied [toilettage and refurring] for years, then I apprenticed. It was a long time before I opened my own shop. My prices are higher because I have education and experience. My customers should understand that. If you only do toilettage for a couple of weeks a year, you aren't going to develop the kind of know-how that I have and you aren't going to be able to deal with things when they go wrong. Some businesses, I think, are better suited to pop-up than others. I don't think that grooming is one of them," she said.

According to Bjørn, CPAP intends to fast-track its investigation and hopes to be able to report back to Park consumers and retailers by the end of the year.

That prospect pleases Boxer.
"With hibernation season
upon us, we all want to be able to
make the best refurral choices,"

she says.

EM recalls FeralNoMore™ over safety concerns

In an unprecedented move, The Park's Department of Well-Being and Safety (DWBS) has ordered retailers to halt sales of a popular scent-masking agent.

Enterprises Moufettes, S.A., the manufacturer of FeralNoMore™ says it is recalling ten thousand cans of the spray after several Animals reported suffering ill effects from the product. The DWBS reported that two Animals were so overcome that they required short-term hospitalization.

The product, which the DWBS recommended last Spring in its Travel Advisory, is used by Animals to mask their origin and species, so that they may travel more freely outside The Park. In the recent past, FeralNoMore™ and other scent-masking agents have been credited with preventing a number of crimes against Park Animals, including kidnapping and enforced domestication.

According to a spokesanimal for the DWBS, the most common conditions associated with FeralNoMore™ include pruritus (itching) and alopecia (hair loss). Both these effects are temporary, the spokesanimal said, and Animals can be treated either in the physician's office or at the Park Hospital. Reports of memory and identity loss are unsubstantiated, the spokesanimal said.

The spray product was a popular purchase at many shops in The Park, including the Reek-O-Rama and Footpad Heaven.

In a statement issued after the recall, Enterprises Moufettes said that it hopes to isolate the problem and return the product to market "as soon as possible."

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Popular Park restaurant shut down by health inspectors

he popular Park restaurant, The Compost Heap, was shut down by health inspectors early last weekend after several of its patrons fell ill on Thursday.

 $Seven Animals, who \, describe$ themselves as "regulars" at the 24-hour eating establishment, reported feeling violently ill and were taken, separately, by the Elephant Emergency Brigade (EEB) to the Park Hospital. All were treated for gastrointestinal problems. Two Animals remain in hospital, while the other five have returned to



their abodes.

According to Inspector Konrad Eule, head of The Park's Commercial Food Safety Bureau (CFSB), the Animals fell ill several hours after ingesting food served at the restaurant. Inspector Eule said his bureau, which has close ties to The Park's Department of Well-Being and Safety, is treating the incident as a food safety issue unless it uncovers evidence of suspicious or criminal activity.

"We are currently investigating with regard to food preparation and storage, but we have sent samples to the laboratory for testing and we are on alert for signs of tampering," he said at a press conference held yesterday. He dismissed rumours that chemicals and bits of plastic were found in the food and criticized such statements as "inflammatory and, generally, unhelpful."

At the press conference, the restaurant's manager, Winifred D. Raccoon, reading from a prepared statement, said that the restaurant "values its clientele beyond measure" and intends to do everything in its power to ensure that its food is safe. The restaurant's owner, Gilbert Bartholomew Ratte, was not available for comment.

Asked whether the incident would affect The Park's upcoming food festivals and other celebrations, the Inspector said he did not believe there was any reason to delay any events "unless and until we receive results that would prompt such action." He warned, however, that even though most food establishments adhere to The Park's strict safety code, Animals should always be vigilant when eating away from

t a news conference held yesterday, the 27 AZ Archons outlined some of the strategies they plan to employ at the end of their term to stabilize The Park's economy and to avert chaos and panic among The Park's citizens and residents.

These economic strategies, some of which have been acted upon already, include extending retail business hours, providing businesses with hiring incentives, and establishing an outreach programme for Park retail establishments that the Archons hope will stimulate trade with Animals (and, possibly, Humans) outside The Park. The Archons also plan to "keep in touch with the citizenry" via a weekly broadcast on Park radio and television.

At the end of the conference, which was held in the foyer of the Legislative Assembly Building, Balthasar Alouatta, press secretary to the Archons, fielded questions about the Archons' decision to change the date of the celebration of Jor's birthday. Many in The Park believe the decision was taken in order to appease members of The Park's hibernating communities, who felt they had been blamed for the economic downturn. Alouatta assured the media that the decision was in no way an economic response to the hibernators' lobbying efforts. Rather, he said, it was taken "with a long view to harmonizing Park holidays with both business imperatives and the needs of our citizens to feel they are full participants in Park life.

Alouatta was also asked about recent rumours that the Archons plan to "shore up their financial base" by instituting a mandatory payment system to the government, also known as a tax. Alouatta said he had not been told about any plans for a tax and that such a drastic move would not and could not be made by the Archons without input from The Park's citizens. Since the establishment of Zoocracy, government funds, which support education, medical care, the law courts, Park programmes, and Park celebrations, have come from donations made by Park businesses and by private citizens. Park residents are under no legal obligation to contribute to the Archons' funds.

Museum funds "on hold" as Park economy faces difficulty

Archons announce new strategies for Park

n one of their first acts, The Park's 35 incoming Archons put a "temporary" hold on funding for the new historical museum.

The museum, which will chronicle the social, cultural, political, and economic history of The Park was expected to open within five years. The provisional management board had expected to receive funding from a number of Park businesses, as well as from the Archons. Much of that funding has dried up, as well, according to Sukuta Rhinoceros, head of the provisional board and one of the museum's founders.

"Things were going swimmingly until this slump in the [Park's] economy," the Rhinoceros said at a press conference recently. "It's sent us into a tailspin and I don't know when we'll be able to say with any certainty that our plans [for building | will go forward."

In the meantime, however, the Rhinoceros confirmed that the design competition for the museum building will go ahead.

'We're a few months late, but whenever we do start to build, we'll need a design, so there's no point in delaying plans for that," she said.

Stuffed Dogs Don't Shed: controversial film opens Park **Interspecial Film Festival**

tuffed Dogs Don't Shed, the controversial new film by Varden I.W. Spaniel, opened the 5th annual Park Interspecial Film Festival (PIFF) on the 1st of Felis. The Festival premiere was attended by Spaniel, as well as by the film's stars, I.S. Chow and Bisbee

The film is Spaniel's fourth release, but his first to be screened at PIFF. Stuffed Dogs is also the first Park-produced film to be adapted from another medium. Based on the hit song of the same name by Thisbe and the Barkettes, the film tells the story of a Dog who is "rescued" by a pair of Humans. The circumstances of the Dog's so-called adoption, as well as the difficulties that ensue when they try to adjust to interspecial life make for what some reviewers have called a "dark tale."

Produced by Torsten Münsterländer's Pointer Productions, the film features newcomer, Bisbee Bichon, the park

as the main character's new best friend, Delilah. All the Humans in the film were played by real-life Humans. Their names have never been released.

The film sparked controversy during shooting in The Park last year, when a group of Humans picketed the set in protest against what they considered to be an unfair and unflattering portrayal of their species.

Stuffed Dogs was originally scheduled to screen as part of the Hot Dogs section of the Festival, but organizers moved it to the Features section after it was nominated for the 26 AZ True Tails award. The film subsequently lost that award, but picked up two others from The Park's Directors' League: a Golden Cap for Spaniel, and a Golden Ruff for Bisbee Bichon.

Let's Talk Balls! with Bailey

Today's Ball is the CRICKET ball

The cricket ball has a long history with Dogs.

Originally employed in the Mediaeval period, cynologists (those who study Dogs) believe that the cricket ball was first employed by Dogs as a tool in the annual harvesting of the fields in Mediaeval Africa.

Scholars familiar with the period cite the drama of the time, commonly known as "Meerakle Plays," as evidence that the balls were regularly used for two purposes: the harvesting of cotton and, later, protecting the farm against thieving Meerkats

The balls, which were constructed of cork from the northern part of Africa, are believed to have been transported to the south for the purpose of harvesting cotton. This the Dogs did by rolling the balls over the cotton as it lay in mounds on the ground, after it had been picked off the bush. As the balls picked up the cotton, they grew larger and larger until they became impossible to roll. The farmers, then, collected the balls, removed the mass of cotton from the cork base, and tossed them back to the Dogs. This tossing action scared the Meerkats and the farm Dogs soon began to use this method to secure the fields. The Dogs tossed the balls, first with their paws and, later, with branches and twigs that they collected from nearby trees.

Centuries later, after cotton harvesting became automated and other methods were used to secure the farms, the tossing of the cricket ball remained a popular pastime among the farm Dogs.

Since that time, Dogs everywhere have enjoyed various forms of play with the cricket ball.
